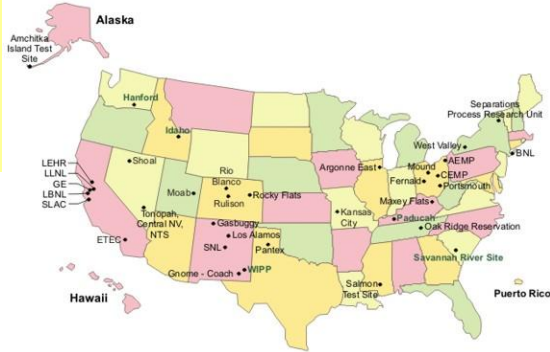


DOE/EM CLEANUP SITES

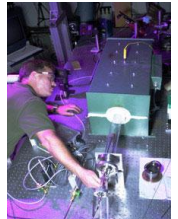

OVERVIEW

As a result of our nation's development of its nuclear arsenal during the cold war, weapons production and/or weapons plants around the country created a need for the government to decontaminate these sites by cleaning up the residual from the nuclear waste. In response to this need, in 1989 at the Department of Energy, the Office of Environmental Management (EM) was created to assess and cleanup inactive waste sites and facilities around the country. Our assessment and cleanup efforts include ensuring the development and implementation of safe and effective waste management operations, developing and implementing aggressive applied waste management operations and applied waste research and development programs that utilize innovative and cost effective environmental technologies to address permanent disposal of high and low level nuclear waste.

It is our goal to be an employer of choice with a well-trained, inquisitive, motivated workforce that will excel at its job. To accomplish this goal in part, we are looking for the next generation of technical competence and leadership through the EM Professional Development Corps (EMPDC).

The EMPDC is a structured program of on-the-job training, formal training, and developmental assignments designed to create a new generation of technical expertise and future leadership.

THE PROGRAM COMPONENTS

- ❖ 2 Years Developmental Training
- ❖ On-site rotational assignments
- ❖ Off-site 60 day (minimum) rotation
- ❖ Core Curriculum of Classroom Training (10 – 12 weeks)
- ❖ Paid Tuition Towards Earning a Graduate Degree (upon completion of 2 yr program)
- ❖ Optional lump sum recruitment or relocation bonus
- ❖ \$10,000 per year towards student loan repayment
- ❖ Accelerated promotions to higher grade (eligibility after 6 mo vs. 12 mo)

Participants of the EMPDC will be trained to perform duties such as:

- ❖ Accounting/Finance
- ❖ Budgeting/Procurement
- ❖ Construction Management
- ❖ Contracts Acquisition/Management
- ❖ Emergency Management
- ❖ Environmental Compliance
- ❖ Nuclear Criticality
- ❖ Project Management
- ❖ Quality Assurance
